Areas of Funding

Our Work in 2022

Improving Oral Health Equity for People with Disabilities

For more than 6.5 million people in the United States with an intellectual or developmental disability, oral health care is often inaccessible. Our grantmaking aims to challenge those oral health disparities through policy change, provider training, stigma reduction and education.

- Continued funding <u>free, online provider training</u> in partnership with Penn Dental Medicine focused on strengthening skills in treating people with disabilities.
- Awarded \$2 million to the Indiana University
 School of Dentistry to construct a clinic to care for

- Expanded the <u>Centers for Inclusive</u>


 Dentistry program.
- Hosted a <u>free photoshoot for Michiganders with</u> <u>disabilities</u>, with images provided to families and dental clinics, to help promote inclusivity in dentistry.
- Supported the creation of <u>Access for All Smiles</u>, a dental health resource for caregivers of adults with disabilities.
- Supported the development of an interdisciplinary curriculum for medical and dental students on caring for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities.



Developing the Oral Health Workforce

Finding new oral health professionals and recruiting them to practice in underserved areas is difficult for a variety of reasons, including geography, a lack of training or interest in public health dentistry, and compensation. We're refocusing our efforts—and partnerships—on expanding and diversifying the oral health safety net.

- Awarded more than \$270,000 in scholarships to support the next generation of diverse oral health professionals.
- Convened more than 60 oral health care providers, educators, advocates, foundation representatives and other stakeholders from across Michigan to discuss the current oral health landscape, including the barriers that prevent access to care, employment, opportunity and education.
- Developed a joint scholarship fund to help train the first class of dental therapists, an important midlevel provider, in Michigan.



Our Work in 2022

Expanding Access to Care

Whether it's funding equipment, more operatories, new and unique programs or tried-and-true public health initiatives, we are committed to providing more opportunities for people to access dental care in their communities.

- Provided ongoing support for <u>community water</u> <u>fluoridation and state-sponsored dental sealant</u> <u>programs</u>.
- Provided more than \$2.2 million to purchase equipment and support programs to improve access to care for people and communities that have been systematically disadvantaged.
- Funded the brand-new <u>Healthy People. Healthy</u>
 <u>Communities. Oral Health Fund</u>. For people in Indiana who have chronic conditions and an immediate need for oral health care services and financial assistance.
- Supported <u>new dental clinics</u> in areas of high need.
- Helped fund events through <u>TeamSmile</u> (Detroit and Cleveland) and <u>Medworks</u> (Cleveland) to provide children and adults with needed dental care along with referrals to dental homes.
- Granted \$1.5 million to develop the technological infrastructure needed to offer free oral health screenings for children entering kindergarten in Michigan.
